

How to Select A Topic and Write Your Proposal

- Review the Chapters in the Course Text
- Select a subject/theme that you find appealing to you (for instance, Socialization, Children, Varsity Sports, Deviance, Violence, Gender, etc.)
- Write a page proposal in which you outline a particular issue within the subject/theme, include a tentative bibliography you will use in your work, and explain in one paragraph why you find that particular issue appealing to you
- This proposal will be submitted to me by January 12/2010 and it is worth 5% of the final mark

Process for your Presentation date

• On January 12th, I will allocate the dates in which you need to present to the class. Be aware that some of you will have limited time to prepare. Strong suggestion is to start working in your presentation by January 5th. The first presentations will be on January 19th.

Helpful Hints for Your Presentation

- Know your material thoroughly. Reading additional material is the very minimum you have to do to pass the presentation (10 references: 6 on line and 4 books/journals)
- Expand on a topic/issue that caught your eyes in the given chapter/article/book.
 Do not make a summary of the chapter/article unless it is absolutely necessary but remember that your peers have already studied this material in Sociology of Sport I
- Do not try to do too much. Focus your topic and deal with the most important, thought provoking ideas. You have between 25 to 30 minutes to do your presentation
- Think about the material "critically." Take a position. Present and develop a coherent argument!
- Don't be afraid to be speculative or provocative. Go with your mind and heart
- When presenting, look up, make eye contact, and speak to the class. It is much better to stumble while referring to your notes than to read verbatim from them

- Feel free to do small field research by interviewing subjects or by observing a particular issue. As well, you may make small documentary pertaining your topic. This information will greatly enhance your presentation
- Bring audio-visual material. Posters, results of surveys in graphic form, tape recorders from interviews, short video clips, etc. Make it attractive!
- Introduce and conclude your presentation. Have a punch line to conclude.
- Enjoy doing it!

Report on Presentation

The report should be around 6-7 pages, double space, 12 ft., Times New Roman, and APA style. Minimum of 10 references as outlined in the "Hints."

Due date: One week after the presentation (or at the presentation)

Missed Tests
